

Bird Box Subcommittee of the Wyomissing Park & Shade Tree Commission –

Summary of Zoom meeting on Friday, February 28, 2025.

Lucy's walkaround with Duane on February 26

- 4 boxes are to be removed and not replaced at this time, for a variety of reasons: These are #4, 9, 19, and 28 on the 2024 map
- 1 box in poor condition in 2024 and removed due to the sewer project will not be replaced until all work in that area is concluded: Box #17
- 6 boxes are to be replaced, along with the posts: #3, 5, 7, 14, 25, and 27.
- Duane carefully marked the exact locations for new boxes, with an arrow to indicate to the crew which direction entrance holes are to face (east). Since his crew's work load is about to explode, they will need to get this done next week (week of March 3)
- Lucy wrapped orange electrician's tape around Bo 29 to obstruct the entrance hole. This box AND nearby Box #1 were claimed by the same male House Sparrow last year, who trapped and killed a Tree Swallow in Box #29. Limiting him to one box this spring should make it easier to trap him. Then Box #29 can be made available.
- When I told Duane that I suspect snakes repeatedly took bluebird eggs or hatchlings from Box #14 (in the middle of the small, level meadow behind the Sherk Bench) he told me that he has seen more snakes in that section of the park than anywhere else. I asked him to remove the present box, with its wooden post, and install a T-post without a box at this time. An effort will be made to install a stovepipe baffle on this post to deter the snakes, and when we obtain boxes from Ken Leister we should not need help from the park crew to install the box.

These changes will leave 12 boxes in the section of the park between Ruth's Bridge and Old Mill Rd, and 13 boxes between Ruth's Bridge and the Quarry.

We reviewed the most recent message from Ken Leister, in which he shared that both he and his wife have been ill. He hopes to have boxes for us by March 8.

The 5 boxes built by Art Zdancewic were painted white by Jean Seelig, to help protect nesting birds during heat waves. Water-based, exterior latex paint with a high Light Reflectance Value was used.

On February 27, during a work session involving Lucy, Jean, and Helen, entrance hole protectors were installed on the 5 white boxes and 5 Noel guards were made. We will keep the Noel guards in reserve, installing them only on boxes with evidence of predation.

New number medallions will be attached to boxes only after the park maintenance crew has installed the new boxes.

The same field data sheets used last year will be used again, with training of the new monitors in their use. Helen is going to attempt to create a Google Document all the

monitors are able to edit, in order to enter their weekly observations. We will adjust the system as needed.

Lucy will act as a trainer, trouble-shooter, and ‘float’ monitor this year – leaving the 25 boxes to be divided among 5 monitors in this way:

Helen Davis:	Boxes #1, 2, 3, 4, 6
Quindi Franco:	Boxes # 5, 8, 10, 18, 29
Margaret Cosbey:	Boxes # 11, 12, 25, 26, 27
Jean Seelig:	Boxes # 16, 20, 21, 24, 30
Chris Hennessy (and Annabelle)	Boxes #13, 14, 15, 31, 32

Each monitor is responsible for doing a pre-season check of their boxes, so that any cleaning or minor repairs can be accomplished prior to the 3rd week of March. The monitoring season will begin the week of March 16.

PUBLIC EDUCATION: Lucy and Jean will work together to create 2 8½ x 11” notices for the park kiosk near Old Mill Rd. One notice will explain the appearance of the white boxes, and the other will urge park-goers to avoid approaching close to the boxes and inform them that anyone who wishes to commit regular time and effort to managing the nest box trail can contact our borough manager. We talked about posting photos of the cavity-nesting birds that typically use our boxes.

Why White Nest Boxes?

Some of the new nest boxes installed in the park this year have been painted white to help protect eggs and young birds from dangerous heat. The temperature inside a box can be as much as 10 degrees higher than the outside air temperature. We used an exterior, water-based latex paint with a high Light Reflectance Value.

HELP NEEDED! Wyomissing Park's 'Bluebird Trail'



Campaigns to encourage placement of nest boxes for bluebirds began in the 1960's, motivated by concern for the conservation of the species and by the enjoyment to be had from having this beautiful bird as a neighbor. Ongoing challenges to the success of this bird include competition for nesting cavities from the non-native House Sparrow, over-use of pesticides on lawns and in agriculture, exposure to PCBs, and outdoor cats.

Bird species who need cavities for nesting and who have benefited from provision of boxes include the Eastern Bluebird, Tree Swallows, American Kestrels, Purple Martins, and some owls and wrens.

Research has determined box design features important for nesting success, such as the size of the entrance hole, depth of the box, and area of the box floor.

Over 30 boxes in the park are designed for bluebirds but are used by a variety of other native birds as well: Tree Swallows, House Wrens, and Carolina Chickadees. The House Sparrow—an aggressive non-native bird from Europe which takes boxes away from the native birds and may kill them in the process—has become a problem in some sections of the park.

Nest boxes that are not properly designed, monitored, and managed can do more harm than good, as they may result in nesting efforts doomed to failure by predation, insect infestation, House Sparrow attack, or other hazards.

Management of the nest boxes in this park is carried out with oversight from the borough and with the assistance of the park maintenance staff. Any activity involving nest boxes in the park must be coordinated through the Borough Manager, Michele Bare, 610-376-7481, ext. 108 or mbare@wyomissingboro.org. Boxes installed without permission, and those without a monitor registered with the Borough may be removed or moved.

More help is needed now with both monitoring the boxes and keeping the boxes in good repair. If you are interested in being trained to join the team, or have carpentry skills to offer, please contact the Borough Manager.

WYOMISSING PARK SYSTEM RULES

STAY ON TRAILS
Please walk and ride on designated trails only. No off-trail activities are permitted in the parkland or on the water. Please stay out of the water, ponds, and wetlands, following the posted signs.

CARRY OUT YOUR TRASH
Please pick up all trash, even if it is someone else's. Please do not litter. Please do not feed the birds.

LEASH YOUR PET
Pets are permitted, but must be leashed at all times. Please do not allow your pet to enter the water or to disturb the birds.

PICK UP PET WASTE
Dog waste is a health hazard for people, wildlife, and plants. Please bag your pet's waste, and take it with you. Please do not throw it in the woods.

LEAVE IT AS YOU FIND IT
Please leave all plants, flowers, shrubs, and wildlife for all visitors to enjoy. The cutting of wood, hunting, or trapping are not permitted. Fishing is permitted and the fishing area must be followed.

NO HUNTING OR TRAPPING
Hunting and trapping are not permitted. Fishing is permitted and the fishing area must be followed.

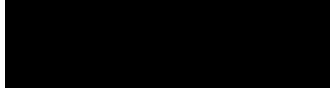
I do work a full time job but would be able to work my schedule around when your group meets. I would also be willing to be on a subcommittee, with interest in the bird box committee.
